Welcome Erik Vandenberg



I'm an Engineer who's predominately been working in the Oil & Gas industry for the last 12 years, mainly on LNG plants and Gas Fired Power Stations. I started my career in the Aviation industry, however quickly shifted my focus to Industrial Gas fired Turbines and associated processes in the Liquefied Natural Gas industry. My main focus these days has been on commissioning of process systems for handover to the client's operations groups.

I've recently moved to Darwin from Melbourne, where I have been a member of the Rotary Club of Brighton for the last four years. In 2015 I founded a Rotary charity project called Sustainable Communities - Cambodia which aims to improve the lives of around 4000 impoverished people living in Rural Northern Cambodia, with aims to expand the scope into other parts of Cambodia, Asia and the world as the current goals are achieved.

I have served as the International Director for the Rotary Club of Brighton for the 2015/16 Rotary year, during which time I travelled to Cambodia where our project implemented bio-sand filters to around 100 families. We also awarded a scholarship to some Melbourne film students to accompany us and make a short fundraising video and short documentary, which

is now around 80% complete. I've been working on a 'Crowd Funding' fundraising campaign for the Cambodian project, which was launched at the beginning of April to help raise much needed funds for the project.

In around 2006 in my spare time between time away working I built an automotive business in Melbourne specialising in mechanical and electrical repairs and maintenance of German vehicles called Auto Dynamics, at peak the business employed 10 people, before I sold it in 2015 whilst travelling between Melbourne and Darwin for the Ichthys project.

I have a 15 year old son called Jake who is currently in Austria with Rotary Youth Exchange, he'll be travelling back to Darwin at the beginning of 2017 to continue his high school studies in Year 11. Jake enjoys playing soccer and one of his favourite hobbies is producing electronic music. He was also a junior lifesaver in Melbourne but is undecided about whether or not to brave the crocs and continue on in Darwin next year.

I have a beautiful wife named Terri, who is an experienced Physiotherapist and Exercise Physiologist who works for her own newly created Darwin Based Injury Management consultancy business called Workplace Injury Management Solutions. We enjoy cycling together and going on holidays together when we get the opportunity.

I haven't got any favourite hobbies, I occasionally participate in pistol shooting, golf (AKA hacking...), cycling, motorbike riding, fishing, camping, I want to get into sailing one of these days. Also when I get some time I'd like to continue what I started 18 years ago and get back into flying lessons to complete my pilot's licence.

The major speaker of the evening – Bob Shewring - was then introduced by Ray. It was apparent by the way Ray introduced Bob that he holds him in very high regard. Bob is a third generation Territorian, he is a past president of a Darwin Rotary Club and is currently V.P. of RSL Darwin and has a distinguished history serving in the military.



Bob spoke about a programme he is running called "Operation Bring Them Home". Almost all of the first 25 members of the armed forces who were killed in action during the Vietnam War are not buried in Australia. At the beginning of the war, it was not Australian policy to bring home the bodies of those killed in action. However, after a short while, that was changed and of the 521 official deaths related to the war, 496 of the bodies were returned to Australia.

Before the policy changed, the families of the first 25 were given the option of returning their family members remains at their own expense of £500, which was about half of the average Australian wage at that time, this equates to approximately \$30,000 in today's money. Most could not afford this. 24 of the soldiers were buried

at Terandak, a (then) British Military base in Malaysia and 1 soldier is buried in Singapore. When the policy changed, they were not contacted and given the option to return their family member.

Bob has campaigned and won the support of the government to return the bodies. This was no small matter as the bodies are on foreign land and the current governments need to sort many details. One of the soldiers is a Territorian and will be returned to the Territory to have an official burial at Adelaide War Memorial on 11 June 2016. Prior to this there will be a service in Darwin to honour him. Bob also wanted to note that the Adelaide War Memorial is 'locked' to new burials and had to be 'unlocked' in this instance.

After a break for dinner a number of questions were raised, including what about the bodies from the first and second world wars. Bob noted that at the time they didn't really have the technology to return so many bodies and the volume and technical issues make that improbable now.

Jim McNally gave heartfelt thanks to Bob.



Next up was Mari Nagai, our exchange student, Fingers introduced her and noted that she had quietly noted the difference between our club and her that of her father we're a lot rowdier and not as respectful towards each other!

Mari gave a 'me speech'. She was born in Imabari (also spelt Imibari), a city on the Island of Sikoku in Southern Japan. It is famous for a number of things: it's beaches; it's

extremely long bridge and subsequent bridges linking Sikoku Island and a chain of islands to

the mainland which, at over 70kms, offers great views and is considered a great day's bicycle ride. Other famous features include: the 16th century castle; the shipbuilding industry; Imabari towels – which are reputedly some of the finest and softest made in the world - and last but not least the Kokoubunzi temples.

She has a 14 year old brother and a pet dog. Her mother and father are both 42, he is an architect and she is a treasurer for a number of organisations. The family like to go camping every year for their holidays.

She rated the Safari as “Awesome” with many highlights, but perhaps the utmost was climbing Uluru. It was scary. She will never forget her experience, there were 26 students from 11 countries and she made many new friends.

Questions: John B asked “how do you find the Australian boys?” Mari was a little confused by this and the question was rephrased to “do you like Australian boys?” An emphatic “yes” was given.

Overall everyone was very impressed by her presentation and the great progress she is making with her English. This was emphasized by the intense applause at the end.

John B gave an update on the Girl Guide Hut: progressing well, the toilets are being completed in the next 6 weeks and then a final coat of paint for completion of the project.
